The outreach that Zell had went beyond the senior class. Sophomore, Dylan Lichty reminisces, "We did this really cool pumpkin decorating contest with the whole fourth grade. We got to send them to the State Fair, and won first place!" Lichty also remembers Zell's caring nature and positive attitude saying, "She was for sure the nicest teacher in the whole school." Continuing with the memories, Gracee Thompson, sophomore, looks back upon her favorite times with Zell. "She had a closet, and everyday that you came to class with your planner signed, you got a ticket that let you buy anything from the closet!" Thompson said that what she remembers most about Zell is, "She was really nice and my absolute favorite teacher."

Zell was an accomplished teacher, but most of all, an amazing friend to many. The legacy she leaves will impact students forever.

When asked whether he would be returning, Kruse said, "Yes, rather than going through the trouble of my parents abandoning their jobs in order to teach us." Paw says, "I'm going to [come back] but I'll have to be super cautious and careful, I really don't want to miss out on the rest of my senior year."

Heidi Holforty, German teacher at HHS, while aware of the challenges some families face, is happy to have distance learners returning for second semester. "I am really looking forward to having my distance learners in class again! When students are in school, interacting with peers and adults, they are learning so much more than reading, writing, and arithmetic. These students, with their various personalities, also add so much to our classroom." Holforty continued, "I understand there are families who may be compromised by the effects of Covid, and I know the teachers will accommodate them to the best of their ability."


Blackout poetry

Winter driving tips

Winter was late, but it still came. With as much time as we've had to prepare and practice for it, driving and parking in the snow can still be challenging. Even on warm, sunny days, some people still have trouble parking within the lines. But with snow covering the lines in the parking lots and on the roads it makes it even harder. This article will attempt to make driving and parking easier for everyone.

One of the many ways to park better is opening the door when parking to tell where the lines are in relation to the vehicle. Knowing the size of your vehicle is another way to enhance your driving and parking skills. When snow covers the lines in the parking lots, simply run

your foot along the ground until you find the line and clear off the entireline too make sure your vehicle is parallel to the lines.

Driving in the winter on snow and ice can be stressful for some people. One of the ways to prevent or reduce stress is to have good tires on your vehicle. Tires with deep tread and siping (cracks in the tread of the tire) are especially good on snow and ice. Larger, heavier, and 4-wheel-drive vehicles are better for the snow and ice because the weight puts more friction and pressure onto the road and 4-wheel-drive takes away the resistance of the front wheels to move.

Maintaining control of the vehicle is essential to safe and stress free-driving. Do not speed up too fast, especially on a crowned or sloped road because the wheels can slip and lose traction and slide downhill or spin. With rear wheel drive vehicles, if the rear wheels slip and the vehicle starts to rotate, keep the steering wheel pointed in the direction you wish to

When braking, do not push too hard on the pedal because the front wheels have stronger, tighter brakes and will lock up, taking away your ability to steer. Newer vehicles have anti-lock brakes. the grinding sound of the brake pedal when depressed too hard.
